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## PREFACE

Initially, I did not set out to compile a complete history of Moses Tullis' descendants, but rather to go on my direct line gathering all the descendants of my great-grandfather James Moses Tullis and Sarah Ann Smith, his wife, to the present. As I corresponded with others over the years, I found others who were also researching independently on the Tullis family tree. It was inevitable that sooner or later all our paths would cross, and eventually, when that did occur, a steady and continuous exchange of information has been taking place. I think this occurred after Don and Linda began to publish "The Tullis Tracer". It occurred to me that it would be necessary to cooperate one with another as many sent Xeroxed copies of the exact same documents I had paid a researcher for. It seems vital to work together to avoid unnecessary duplications in the great mass of materials that have come to light. We should strive to avoid duplication of efforts.

The reader will notice, as he pursues this book, that not all families are complete nor are all lines extended to the present. I felt it was best to go ahead with the publication. We can communicate and preserve the knowledge of the family which has been acquired.

A great portion of the book contains data supplied by various members of the family. A conscientious attempt has been made to incorporate all statistics and name spellings into the book as were found in the various records and documents as they were passed on to me by family members. I am aware, with a work of this kind, errors do creep in; therefore, I ask forgiveness on this point.

I began this family tree in 1950 and have strived to get all the primary sources of information possible. I have amassed a great number of records which I have numbered and filed. I have many Xeroxed copies of Bible records, marriage certificates, death certificates, land and deeds, wills and inventories, Rev. War records, obituaries, DAR applications, Civil War records, County Histories. I have many Tullis marriage records that were extracted from the original records, many census records, I have copies of correspondences over the years. I have used the CFI records at the LDS Branch Library, where I work.

## ABOUT THE COMPILER

ZOLA SCOTT HARDY

I waited until mama got the cows milked that Sunday evening, 28th of Oct 1917, to make my appearance. Our farm was just south of Ringgold, LA. Aunt Ola Scott was there to assist Dr. Ben Allums with my grand entrance into this world.

We moved to Hall Summit so I could be near enough to walk to school my first year. My papa was a barber and farmer. We made a trip to California when I was eight to visit Aunt Zola Sheffield. That was such a great experience. From that time, I dreamed of living in that wonderful place. In the meantime, I had all the experiences of farm life and work.

When my sister Lottie graduated in 1933, she went to California and the next summer came back to visit and I returned with her. I got a job as a mother's helper for \$5 a month in the home of T. C. Griffith who had two children. I graduated from Glendale High in 1936. I attended Glendale Beauty Academy, graduating in 1937. I worked at Lottie's Beauty Shop until I married Phil Hardy in 1940. Bert Shook introduced us. They were ironworkers together. We were always best friends.

In 1941 we were off to Hawaii on a construction job. We lived at Kailua when the war started. Phil was working at Kanehoe Naval Air Station. We had some exciting experiences. Phil joined the Cee Bees and was sent to the war front for 17 months. I stayed in Kailua and worked as a censor for the Naval Intelligence Department.

We adopted Mike in April 1946. By age two, we were advised to take him to a different climate. We sold our new home at Lanikai and came to California for a year, afterwards moving to Arizona where we lived for the next 16 years. We got our 1st little girl Priscilla, in Ajo, AZ, a year later we got Jerri Leilani. We lived in Phoenix until 1965 when we moved to the mid west for a couple of years. We were back in "sunny" California by 1968 where we have remained.

I was introduced to genealogy when we lived in Ajo, AZ and in 1950 returned to LA for a visit with my relatives there. I saw Bibles and old account books, memorabilia that sparked my interest in learning more about my ancestors. It has been great fun.

I have enjoyed playing golf and deep sea fishing. My favorite subjects are religion, genealogy and health nutrition. One of my ambitions is to go to Guatamala to see the ancient ruins.
